Abdoslam Baabbad

Master's in Applied Economics

Boston College

Due to most of the first-born children born in my country needing to work in order to financially support their families, many do not finish their education. The Hadhramout Foundation gave me the hope that I would be able to fulfill these dreams, and through them I got a scholarship to Umm Al Qura University where I got my Bachelor's in Economics with First Honors in 2018. Master's in Pharmaceutical Science

University of Colorado Denver

My name is Sauda Basaleh. I was born and raised in Hadhramout, specifically in Ash-Shihr. I obtained my PharmD degree from the University of Hadhramout in Yemen. I worked for one academic year as a teaching assistant, and then with the support of The Hadhramout Foundation, I began my Master's in Pharmaceutical Sciences. I am specializing in clinical pharmacokinetics and pharmacodynamics at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus, which is one of the highest-ranking American universities in pharmaceutical sciences.

The field that I am studying now impacts the research, clinical, and academic aspects of the healthcare system. This science accompanies medicine from its manufacture until after its application. It is also important in providing the type of optimal treatment for each patient specifically. In other words, it is the science by which the drug becomes approved or rejected, and the critical condition is able to be treated effectively.

Healthcare, like the other essentials of life, has been significantly affected and deteriorated in Yemen while the world develops and progresses. It is my hope that my people could access medical services that would improve their quality of life and save their lives. I hope that the era of mortality due to morbidity will be controlled and the urgent need to travel abroad for treatment ends. I believe that I have to be one of the founders of the advanced health and research era in Yemen, and it is something I am preparing for.





Ahmed Eshaq

Master's in Chemical Engineering
University of Washington

I was born and raised in Sana'a, the capital city of Yemen, where my best childhood memories were made. Since I was young, I have excelled at my studies, which resulted in high expectations of me from my family and myself. I finished my secondary school with excellence, and I was able to get a scholarship to Sana'a University. However, at that time, Sana'a dipped into chaos and protesting occurred to overthrow the governmental system. Consequently, I began to look for a scholarship to pursue my undergraduate study abroad at an esteemed university. Then, my father recommended to me that I apply for The Hadhramout Foundation scholarship as they sponsor distinguished Yemeni students. I was happily able to be one of those that received a scholarship to pursue my undergraduate study at King Fahd University of Petroleum and Minerals.

I left my country in December 2013 to continue my education as a chemical engineering student in Saudi Arabia at King Fahd University. The undergraduate program at King Fahd University of Petroleum & Minerals (KFUPM) has provided me with a strong foundation of Chemical Engineering principles. It also exposed me to all of its various fields, including reducing the effects of climate change and enhancing the environment. Throughout my undergraduate study, I would receive news from home about the war, where I lost many innocent friends and relatives. Also because of the war, the financial situation of my family became very difficult and that made me feel responsible to both study and work simultaneously so I could transfer living expenses to them. Despite all of these obstacles I have been confronted with, I was able to graduate from KFUPM with a Second Honors distinction and my graduate project won an award as the best chemical engineering project design in that semester throughout the university.

Post-undergraduate study, I decided to pursue my Master's Degree in Chemical Engineering at the University of Washington, one of the prestigious universities in the United States. I once again sought a scholarship from Hadhramout Foundation and I was fortunate enough to receive it. Life presents us with tremendous opportunities as well as unique challenges. My decision to pursue a master's in chemical engineering is motivated by a desire to contribute to the development of this industry in the future. After finishing my studies in chemical engineering, I am planning on gaining solid practical experience in the United States by working within the chemical industry. My plan for the future is to then hopefully contribute to the development of chemical industries in my own country when the war ends.

Master's in Negotiation and Conflict Resolution
Columbia University

My name is Hamad Aldhlea and I am a Yemeni student sponsored by The Hadhramout Foundation. When I was 17 years old, the Yemeni youth revolution started a crisis in my country against the Saleh regime. As a result, I saw a need for divergent groups to come together. However, it was not until several years later that I learned of peacemaking and conflict resolution as a field of study. As a result, for my undergraduate degree I majored in Engineering in college thinking that my work in that field could improve the infrastructure of Yemen. Yet, even at that time, I knew in my heart that I wanted to become a peacemaker to help my country. Sadly, it continues to have a desperate need to help resolve the current war and its aftermath.

The people of Yemen are the first and most severely affected victims in this conflict. Due to a lack of educational specialties there, I decided to come to America to continue my studies with the help of The Hadhramout Foundation. I am currently working on my Master's Degree in Negotiation and Conflict Resolution (NECR) at Columbia University. Without the intervention of peacemakers, these conflicts will continue into the future unabated.

Unfortunately, the war in Yemen continues and has resulted in a yearning need for conflict resolution. My heart hurts at the thought of all the pain and suffering this war has brought to my country. Based on my knowledge of the current situation in my country, I think we need peacemakers to resolve this crisis. Because peace is also an important post-conflict strategy, I believe that my country needs even more mediators after the crisis to handle the stability of the country. Peace is not just a passive word. Rather, it is an active foundation of state stability, and an important pillar upon which people's lives depend. I firmly believe that without peace, there can be no stable life.

I want to complete my MS and PhD degrees in this discipline to help bring peace and human rights to my devastated country. Once this is complete, I would like to contribute to other generations in Yemen through teaching at one of the universities as well as leading by example as an administrator. By doing this we will have more capable people within Yemen that can continue the healing process. These things will help me reach my ultimate goal, which is to be a leader in restoring the meaning to my country's name: 'Happy Yemen.'

Master's in Journalism
Northwestern University

My name is Saeed Abdullah Ba Abdullah and I am a graduate student in the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University. I was born the youngest of five children in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, from a Hadhrami family that migrated from Yemen to Saudi Arabia in 1950. As the youngest, I was afforded the opportunity to follow my ambition to become a professional journalist. In 2015, I graduated from King Abdulaziz University with honors. I also received a diploma from Aljazeera in TV Presentation.

The Hadhramout Foundation has a great reputation in Saudi Arabia. It is known to offer a variety of scholarships to Yemeni students to complete their higher education in different countries, such as the United States and Canada. I met and interviewed with The Hadhramout Foundation, and I received a scholarship to study English and journalism in the United States.

Unfortunately, I was faced with some challenges in 2017. I was on a plane to continue my academic journey in the United States, but the US administration had decided to ban entry to Yemenis. When I arrived at John F. Kennedy Airport, I was detained, my visa was canceled, and I was sent back to Saudi Arabia. Despite everything that happened, I did not give up on my goals. I found a program in Canada, interviewed and received a Canadian visa, and went there to study English instead.

While there, I had the unique opportunity to explore cultures and language in one of the most diverse countries in the world. I feel that my experience in Toronto helped refine my academic and professional skills in a way that I could not attain in any other environment simply because of the daily access I had to the English language.

After studying in Canada, I obtained a U.S. visa to attend a Media and Global Communication program at the University of California, Irvine. During that time, I requested a scholarship to study journalism from The Hadhramout Foundation at one of the most-distinguished universities in the United States. With their support, I became a graduate student at Northwestern University to begin fulfilling my dream.
